Please know that we are committed to ongoing evaluation and improvement of this plan. We will continue to monitor, evaluate and refine it to ensure the best possible experience for students, families, and staff.

Recommendations for Students and Parents

Tips to Support Your Child:

- Organize a dedicated learning space at home with all the materials your child will need to work efficiently. This should be a common, quiet space with internet access where your child can be supervised.
- If your child will be using the webcam, please review the surroundings. All video conferencing and recording should be done in a common space with a neutral background, if possible.
- Please help your child develop a daily schedule with reminders to take regular breaks from work and digital devices. Suggested schedules are available upon request.
- Please help your child keep a regular bedtime and engage in physical activity as often as possible.
- Check-in with your child regularly throughout the day.

Primary (Grades JK-3) Guided Learning Plan

Teachers have planned activities connected to our curriculum guided by clear learning objectives. Teachers will share a plan of these activities by 9AM on Monday mornings. Any items that need to be provided to the teacher are due by Friday afternoon. Teachers will reach out to families periodically throughout the week.

There will be a balance between digital and non-digital activities. The primary form of communication between teachers and families will be parental emails. We recognize every family's circumstances are different and that completion of some of these activities will require increased parent supervision and engagement. We request parents partner with teachers by providing support in the following ways:

- Monitor email updates daily.
- Share the learning activities with your child and check in regarding progress.
- Contact your child's teacher with questions or concerns.

Parents will be asked to return some of the provided activities so teachers can monitor student progress.

Key Points:

- The official School Calendar will be followed. Therefore, previously identified days set aside as Student Holidays will remain holidays and no assignments will be given on these days.
- The Specialists teachers will provide a choice board, similar to TIC-TAC-TOE. These activities are optional, but provide great opportunities for "non-academic" learning.

Intermediate (Grades 4-5) Guided Learning Plan

Teachers have planned activities connected to our curriculum guided by clear learning objectives. Teachers will share a plan of these activities by 9 AM on Monday mornings. Any items that need to be provided to the teacher are due by Friday afternoon. Teachers will reach out to families periodically throughout the week.

The primary form of communication between teachers and families will be Google Classroom and student/parental emails. We recognize every family's circumstances are different and that completion of some of these activities will require increased parent supervision and engagement. We request parents partner with teachers by providing support in the following ways:

- Check-in with your child regarding progress as he/she gets used to virtual learning.
- Review the weekly email from your child's teacher with your child.
- Contact your child's teacher with questions, concerns, and suggestions.

Students will be asked to return some of the provided activities so teachers can monitor student progress. Many of these grades will be reflected in Google Classroom.

Key Points:

- Language Arts and Math will meet daily (Monday Thursday), Religion and Social Studies/Science will alternate. Fridays will be used as a "catch-up day."
- The official School Calendar will be followed. Therefore, previously identified days set aside as Student Holidays will remain holidays and no assignments will be given on these days.
- Teachers will set aside two consistent "office hour" times each day one in the morning, the other in the afternoon. During these times, they will be available to students/parents.
 Teachers will share "office" hours directly with families/students.
- The Specialists teachers will provide a choice board, similar to TIC-TAC-TOE. These activities are optional, but provide great opportunities for "non-academic" learning.

Middle School (Grades 6-8) Guided Learning Plan

All assignments and resources will be linked on your child's Google Classroom. We strongly encourage students to visit with teachers during virtual "office" hours. This is an excellent opportunity for students to ask questions, seek guidance, and stay connected.

Key Points:

- Language Arts and Math will meet daily (Monday Thursday), Religion and Social Studies, Science and World Language will alternate. Fridays will be used as a "catch-up day."
- Each class is limited to a total student work time of 45 minutes this includes instruction AND individual student practice. Students should have a maximum of three hours TOTAL content learning time each day.
- Teachers are asked to provide direct instruction at the beginning of every lesson instruction will not solely rely on videos from other sources, followed by worksheets.
- Assignments for the day will be posted by 9 AM and will be due to by 12 NOON the following day. They will be posted in both Google Classroom and RenWeb/FACTS.
- The official School Calendar will be followed. Therefore, previously identified days set aside as Student Holidays will remain holidays and no assignments will be given on these days.
- A template of a "student organizer" is shared below. This might be a helpful tool for students to manage the different classes and different lessons.
- Teachers will set aside two consistent "office hour" times each day one in the morning, the other in the afternoon. During these times, they will be available to students/parents.

- The Specialists teachers will provide a choice board, like Summer Bingo. These activities are optional, but provide great opportunities for "non-academic" learning.

Grading:

Many of the activities teachers assign will be graded. These grades will be posted in FACTS/RenWeb. Any assignment that is not submitted by the due date will be marked as "M" - missing. A missing assignment earns zero (0) points. Students will have two weeks from the date the assignment was due to convert the "M" to an earned numerical score. After the two week period, the "M" will be converted to an "T" - incomplete. Once the grade on an assignment has been converted to an "I," the assignment cannot be resubmitted. The "I" will remain in the grade book for the remainder of the marking period. At the end of a marking period, students may earn a final score of either a numerical grade or an "I." Teachers will determine the final score by reviewing all grades earned during the marking period, taking into account both earned numerical values and "I"s.

Expectations for Students:

- Establish daily routines for engaging in learning.
- Identify a comfortable, quiet space in your home where you can work effectively and successfully.
- Regularly check email and Google Classroom for announcements, assignments, and communications from your teachers.
- Complete assignments with integrity and academic honesty, doing your best work
- Follow the <u>Saint Bridget Technology Acceptable Use Policy</u>.
- Do your best to meet timelines, commitments and due dates.
- Communicate proactively with your teachers if you have questions, are unable to meet deadlines, or if you need additional support.

We request Middle School parents partner with teachers by providing support in the following ways:

- Check-in with your child regarding progress as he/she gets used to virtual learning.
- Review FACTS SIS (formerly RenWeb) regularly to monitor grades and assess progress.
- Review weekly emails from administration and/or teachers.
- Contact your child's teacher with questions, concerns, and suggestions.
